Permeable paving also encourages water to enter back into the ground. Did you know roughly one-third of America's wildlife species are at some degree of elevated risk of extinction?

The Recovering America's Wildlife Act (RAWA) will dedicate over \$1.3 billion annually towards proactive, voluntary conservation efforts for wildlife at-risk. The money will be used for on-the-ground conservation efforts such as conserving and restoring habitats, fighting invasive species, reintroducing native species and tackling emerging diseases. Importantly, this includes native plants that grow in the habitats of these species – a provision The Garden Club of America helped draft, protect and steward as the bill made progress over the years. We hope you will pitch in to help it get over the finish line! Stay tuned for a Call To Action later this month!

He had crossed the threshold of teenager into an independent, grownup raptor. No need to flap his wings for his parents anymore. Only now he'll flap them to attract a mate.




