Class 1 Tussy Mussy is a quaint endearing term from the early 1400's, for a small bouquet of herbs and flowers or just flowers – held under the nose to ward off bad odors, "a nose gay" from top of flower to the end of stem not to exceed 10 inches to be displayed in a small vase – taken out of vase to be judged.

HORTICULTURE

HIPPEASTRUM (AMARYLLIS)

Class 1 One beautiful flowering bulb to be displayed in a container of your choice. May be displayed in soil, water or rocks.

Class 2 Novice. Same as above.

Reminder: For the Container Garden Challenge coming up in May, the plants must be owned for at least 3 months prior to entering (February 21, 2024).

Class 1 The Great Estate. Color Photograph. Take a photograph of a well-maintained estate. **Class 2** The Grande Estate Deteriorates. Black and white photograph. Take a photograph of something abandoned, its beauty forgotten.

BOTANICAL ARTS

All plant material used must be dried – that includes flowers, foliage, seeds, pods, nuts (in or out of shells), vegetables, twigs, vines, reeds, etc. Only plant material, mechanics, and their surface treatments (i.e. paints, nail polishes, varnishes, waxes, etc.) are permitted. Artificial, endangered, and locally invasive plant material may not be used. Non-plant material (i.e. cardboard, metal, twine, string, etc.) may be used only for construction and must not show. Botanical Arts is open to all members.

BEJEWELED JANUARY

Class 1 It is a great time to honor and celebrate wonderful artists in the field of Botanical Arts such as GCA's Sarah Boynton. Sarah's talent is her ability to make Botanical Arts jewelry look like estate jewelry (her masterpieces can be viewed on her website <u>SarahBoynton.net</u>). We will be doing the same! Make a wonderful pair of earrings using the Botanical Arts guidelines listed above. You should be able to wear them! The earring posts will be provided by RGC.

CONSERVATION:

RGC Conservation Committee is gearing up for Native Plant Month this April! In our Zone IV, Nell Haughton-Stoneybrook of Princeton, Christina Admunson of Summit, and Robbyn O'Neill of Rumson are guiding all ZIV GCs with plans to encourage Native Plant education and outreach to their municipalities and residents. Please join our planning session at Robbyn O'Neill's home (935 River Road, Fair Haven) on January 29 at 5PM.

NJ Invasive Plant Bill S2186: The Assembly passed the bill in March and the Senate passed this on December 23. It will be signed by the governor sometime soon this month! Have you heard? Rep Mikie Sherril (D-NJ), along with Rep Dave Joyce (R-OH), Sen Martin Heinrich (D-NM), Sen Mike Braun (R-IN), introduced the bipartisan "Building Native Habitats at Federal Facilities Act." The Federal government is one of the nation's largest landowners, and federal facilities are ideal proving grounds for scaling best practices in managing our landscapes, prioritizing healthy and resilient native plants. The Act mandates that federal agencies prioritize native plants when engaging in landscaping work and update their agency facility design standards. <u>Read more here</u>!
