# GCA RULES

1. Please carefully read and follow GCA Flower Show Rules, General Information, and Division Guidelines. All rules as stated in *The Garden Club of America Flower Show and Judging Guide (FS & JG)*, 2025 edition, shall apply.
2. All plant material must be correctly identified with the botanical and common names, if possible. Accepted references for nomenclature are:
  - a. Missouri Botanical Garden Plant Finder at <https://www.missouribotanicalgarden.org/plantfinder/plantfindersearch.aspx>
  - b. Royal Horticultural Society - Find a Plant at <https://www.rhs.org.uk/plants/search-Form>
  - c. [Botanical Nomenclature](#) - GCA Flower Show Committee
3. The Garden Club of America expects all exhibitors to be aware of the need to promote the conservation of endangered and threatened plants. Plants collected in the wild and listed by the New Jersey Natural Heritage Program may not be exhibited in any flower show sponsored by a GCA club. Cultivated plant material listed by New Jersey's Natural Heritage Program may be exhibited if accompanied by a typed card stating that it has not been collected from the wild or that it was collected out-of-state and giving information concerning its cultural requirements and methods of propagation. Natural Heritage Program lists of endangered plant material will be available before and during the show from the division chairs and are available online at <https://plants.usda.gov/home/raritySearch>
4. Plant material showing evidence of insects or disease must be removed immediately from the exhibition area. This rule will be enforced at any time during the show, whenever the problem is identified.
1. Use of the following items is not permitted in Floral Design and Horticulture Divisions: locally endangered or invasive plants, diseased plant material, artificial plant material, live animals of any kind, taxidermy, or anything from or produced by an animal including natural birds' nests, feathers of any kind, bones, coral, hooves, horns, fur, hair (except wool), and shells (sea, turtle, egg, etc.). The Photography Division is exempt from this rule, but all photographs must show respect for the natural world and be taken in an ethically responsible way. Information on invasive plants is available online by searching for New Jersey's list of invasive plants.

## GENERAL INFORMATION

1. Entries are open to all Rumson Garden Club (RGC) members including Provisionals (novice), and professionals in their disciplines, except as noted in the schedule.
2. All designs must be the original work of the exhibitor(s). Although techniques and components may be inspired by other designs, the application of the techniques and components must create an original design that is distinct from the inspiration.
3. Registration is required for all classes, with the exception of those in the Horticulture Division that are weather-dependent (cut specimens, etc.).
4. Classes will be filled in the order registration is received. If there is a limit on the number of classes an exhibitor can enter in a division, it will be specified in the division guidelines.
5. Entering a show constitutes permission to use images of the exhibitor's work in all GCA channels of communication.
6. While The Garden Club of America, the Rumson Garden Club, and the flower show venue will exercise due caution in safeguarding exhibits, responsibility for damage, loss, or personal injury cannot be assumed.
7. Any clarification or change in the rules, as originally stated in the schedule, shall be communicated promptly in writing by the division chairs to all exhibitors in the class and, at the show, to the judges and the passing committee.
8. An entry card must accompany each entry. Entry cards will be available at the show and are available in advance of the show on the Rumson Garden Club website, [www.rumsongardenclubnj.org](http://www.rumsongardenclubnj.org), or upon request from the chairs listed on page 5 of this program. Information required on the entry card can be printed or completed in black waterproof medium. If a sample or key card will be displayed with the entry, it is acceptable to write "See Key card" in lieu of listing plant material on the entry card.
9. ***The passing committee must pass each entry before the exhibitor(s) may leave the show area.*** The passing committee reserves the right to refuse any entry that does not conform to the rules of the schedule. The exhibitor has the option of correcting the entry if time permits. If not corrected, the entry cannot be judged but may remain in place, marked "For Exhibit Only" with a brief, constructively worded statement explaining why it was not judged. Judges may not disqualify any entry passed by the passing committee unless insect infestation or disease is evident.
10. Once an entry is passed, the exhibitor(s) must immediately leave the show floor. The only exception will be the flower show committee members who have entered and been passed according to the timetable. A passed entry may not be touched again by the exhibitor until after judging and then only to carry out necessary maintenance.

11. Only participating judges and clerks will be allowed on the show floor during judging. Flower Show and Division chairs should remain nearby but off the show floor until needed.
12. Containers and accessories should be inconspicuously labeled with the exhibitor's name.
13. For a GCA Flower Show, a "novice" is an exhibitor who has never won first place or GCA Special Award in Floral Design at a Club Show, GCA Flower Show (including GCA Zone and Annual Meeting Flower Shows), GCA Major Flower Show, or Sanctioned non-GCA Major Flower Show. An exhibitor who has won first place or a Special Award in a division is still a novice in the other divisions. Novice award eligibility is marked on the entry card and confirmed at passing.
14. For a RGC *Club* Flower Show, the Rumson Garden Club defines a "regular exhibiting member" as someone who has either earned two first place awards or has accrued at least 16 floral or horticulture class points *in a single show season*. Once an exhibitor has met these requirements, the member's status will change to "regular exhibitor" at the end of the year and will continue for as long as the exhibitor remains a member of the RGC. Until the above criteria is met, a member is considered "novice" for the purpose of exhibiting in a class at a *Club* Flower Show.
15. A Title or Statement of Intent, if required by the class, must be submitted at the time of passing. The statement must be no more than 25 words, typed or printed in black waterproof medium on a 4" X 6" white unlined card.
16. All Judges' decisions are final.
17. All exhibits must remain in place and in show condition until fifteen minutes following the closing time of the show.



# DIVISION I

## Floral Design Guidelines

1. Please carefully read and follow the GCA Rules, General Information, and Timetable for Exhibitors.
2. Advance registration is required by at least one day prior to the show, unless noted in the schedule. Refer to page 13 of this program for registration guidelines.
3. An exhibitor is permitted only one floral design entry *per show* unless otherwise specified in the floral design schedule.
4. The exhibitor(s) whose name(s) the entry has been registered must create and complete the design. All participants must be listed on the entry card. Only listed exhibitors and show personnel may be on the show floor at the time of entry.
5. No more than two exhibitors may execute a design unless otherwise stated in the schedule.
6. If forced to withdraw, an exhibitor must notify the division chair and class consultant and find a substitute unless there is a waiting list for the class.
7. Designs may be executed off-site and brought to the show completed unless otherwise noted in the floral design schedule.
8. All entries must include fresh and/or dried plant material. Fresh plant material must be in water or conditioned in such a way as to remain in pristine form while on exhibition. Rooted plant material is allowed provided no soil is attached with the exception of a pot-et-fleur class.
9. Mechanics should not be visible unless they are an integral part of the design.
10. Anything not prohibited in the GCA Rules, Floral Design Division Guidelines, or individual class descriptions is permitted.
11. Although permitted, the use of cut fruits and vegetables is discouraged and should be undertaken only with proper treatment to prevent spoilage and insect contamination.
12. Accessories and underlays / overlays are permitted unless otherwise stated in the class description.
13. Floral designs have no height restriction unless otherwise noted.
14. All classes may be subdivided at the discretion of the judges or the show chairs *except* those for which a Club Award is named.

15. Questions regarding class requirements may be directed to the class consultant and/or division chair.
16. Judging will be based on the principles of design (balance, contrast, dominance, proportion, rhythm, and scale) and the elements of design (light, space, line, form, color, texture, pattern, and size). Creativity, distinction, conformance to and interpretation of the class and schedule are also considered. 2025 FS & JG, Book 4, pages 22-27.
17. The Scale of points by which 2025-2026 floral design classes are to be judged are listed below. For types of designs *not* listed below (i.e. abstract, miniature, vignettes, etc.), refer to the *FS & JG Book 4: Judging at Flower Shows, 2025 edition, pages 24-48*, for applicable scales of points. *The FS & JG can be found on the GCA website, [www.gcamerica.org](http://www.gcamerica.org).*

# DIVISION I

## Floral Design Classes

### Designing for Formal Dining *A Patriotic Colonial Celebration*

#### **MARY OWEN BORDEN AWARD**

A silver bowl awarded to the member with the best formal dining table design. The exhibitor awarded *Best in Show* from among the first-place winners will be designated the winner of the Mary Owen Borden Award.

#### **Class 1**

**(6) Entries**

Create a *Period Design*\* for an imagined dinner and ball held at Philadelphia's Independence Hall in 1776 celebrating the signing of the Declaration of Independence by the 2<sup>nd</sup> Continental Congress. Design is to be staged on a 66" round diameter by 30" high dining table covered with a floor-length white tablecloth. Accessories, properly treated fruit, and multiple containers are allowed. Viewed and judged from all sides.

#### **Class 2**

**(6) Entries**

Novice. Same as above, however, design to be staged on a 6' long by 30" wide by 30" high rectangular table covered with a floor-length white tablecloth. Exhibitors are given a staging space of 30" width by 30" depth. Accessories, properly treated fruit, and multiple containers are allowed. Viewed and judged from all sides.

#### **Pre-registration is required by May 17, 2026.**

\* *Period Designs* are designs with characteristics typical of a historic period; plant material need not be authentic but must interpret the class dictated by the schedule. FS & JG, Book 5, p. 9.

## **DIVISION II**

### **Horticulture Guidelines**

1. Please carefully read and follow the GCA Rules, General Information, and Timetable for Exhibitors.
2. Advance registration for certain classes is required when notified by Horticulture Chair.
3. An exhibitor may submit a single entry per class, unless specified in the schedule.
4. Entries must have been owned and grown by the exhibitor for a minimum of three months, unless otherwise stated in the schedule.
5. All rooted entries propagated by the exhibitor must be identified with details of the method and relevant date(s) on an accompanying [propagation card](#).
6. Mats, stands, saucers, stakes, ties, etc., are not allowed. Unobtrusive stakes and ties are allowed.
7. Classes may be subdivided, and entries moved and/or reclassified at the discretion of the show committee and/or the judges. Subdivision is preferable in the schedule rather than on the floor.
8. Containers are measured at the diameter or the diagonal of the widest point on the inside of the rim at the soil line.
9. One key card (diagram or plant list) is required when multiple species or cultivars are exhibited in the same container and/or propagation information is applicable. Key card must be on a 4" x 6" white unlined card completed in black waterproof medium. A 4" x 6" photograph with identifying numbers may be used.
10. Container-grown plants must be exhibited in containers that are clean, unobtrusive, and compatible with the exhibit. Terracotta clay pots are preferred. Other options include stone-like (Hypertufa), wire baskets, slatted orchid baskets, and plants mounted on driftwood. Disguised double potting and top dressing are permitted; top dressing must not float when watered.
11. The Rumson Garden Club will provide containers and wedging materials for all cut specimens unless specifically stated in the schedule.
12. Questions regarding class requirements may be directed to the class consultant and/or the division chair.
13. Scale of points by which the classes are to be judged: (as per *FS & JG Book 4: Judging at Flower Shows, 2025 edition*). Points scale is listed under class description.

## **DIVISION II**

### **Horticulture Classes**

All entries must be properly identified with species and cultivar information.

#### **RITCHIE-MOORE TROPHY**

Class 1      Open to all members. Any plant propagated since June 2025. Clay or plastic pots are permitted. Pots not to exceed 4” in diameter. Maximum three pots per member. Points from October 2025 and May 2026 exhibits will be combined to award the Ritchie-Moore Trophy in June. Propagation cards are required.

#### **MARY OWEN BORDEN BOWL**

Class 2      Open to all members. **Four** different kinds (genera) of flowering specimens. One stem or branch of each, to be displayed in **four** RGC containers. *This Class may not be subdivided.*

#### **CONTAINER GARDEN AWARD**

Class 3      Open to all members. A silver bowl awarded to the member exhibiting the best perennial container garden wintered over in a pot outside. Bulbs may be included. Must be owned since November of 2025. The maximum size 14” measured height and width. To be judged by point scale listed below\*.. A 4”X6” white key card is required. *This Class may not be subdivided.*

#### **PAEONIA (PEONY)**

Class 4      One stem, disbudded\*\*, with foliage, to be displayed in a RGC container.  
Class 5      Novice. Same as above. (This class may be subdivided).

#### **SYRINGA (LILAC)**

Class 6      One branch with foliage not to exceed 18” from lip of container to tip of branch, to be displayed in a RGC container.  
Class 7      Novice. Same as above.

#### **ALLIUM**

Class 8      One stem to be displayed in a RGC container. Flower head up to 4” in diameter.  
Class 9      Novice. Same as above.  
Class 10     One stem to be displayed in a RGC container. Flower head larger than 4” in diameter.  
Class 11     Novice. Same as above.

#### **IRIS**

Class 12     Bearded  
Class 13     Novice. Same as above  
Class 14     Non-bearded  
Class 15     Novice. Same as above.

## FANTASTIC FOLIAGE

- Class 16 One leaf or stem of a herbaceous plant grown primarily for its foliage. (Heuchera, Stachys, Artemisia, etc.) *This class may be subdivided.*
- Class 17 Novice. Same as above.
- Class 18 *Hosta* Three **different** varieties of *Hosta* leaves displayed in **three separate** RGC containers.
- Class 19 Novice. Same as above.

## RHODODENDRON

- Class 20 One truss (flower cluster); should be shown half in blossom and half in bud; Leaves should entirely surround the bloom.
- Class 21 Novice. Same as above.

## NATIVE\*\*\* PLANTS

- Class 22 **Three different** flowering native plant stems or branches, arranged in **ONE** RGC container. \*\*\*\*To be judged by scale of points below.
- Class 23 Novice. Same as above.

## VIBURNUM

- Class 24 One stem or branch of any type of flowering viburnum. To be displayed in a RGC container. (This class may be subdivided.)
- Class 25 Novice. Same as above.

## PAR

- Class 26 An exhibit of exceptional horticultural merit, which does not qualify for entry elsewhere in the Horticulture Division. Entries in the Par class must have been owned and grown by the exhibitor for a minimum of one year. Cut specimens are not permitted.

\*\*Disbudded: to remove superfluous or unwanted buds from a plant.

## **DIVISION III**

### **Photography Guidelines**

1. Please carefully read and follow the GCA Rules, General Information, and Timetable for Exhibitors.
2. An exhibitor is permitted only one entry per class.
3. Registration opens May 5, 2026. Entries must be delivered by May 12, 2026.
4. Photographs must be received no later than May 12, 2026. Your registration will be confirmed, and receipt of your photograph will be acknowledged. For information, contact Gail Van Winkle at 732-233-1955.
5. If forced to withdraw, an exhibitor must notify the division chair and class consultant and find a substitute unless there is a waiting list for the class.
6. Photography entries are limited to subjects consistent with The Garden Club of America's interests, including horticulture, floral design, gardens, landscapes, conservation, the environment, historic preservation, civic improvement, and the natural world.
7. No identifiable minor children may be included in photographs.
8. Plant material is strongly encouraged in all photographs.
9. A title/statement of intent is not required.
10. Each photo may only be entered in one show at a time. A photograph previously entered in a Club, GCA, GCA Major, sanctioned non-GCA, or sanctioned non-GCA Major flower show, or *Focus* online contest cannot be re-entered, even with minor edits or reprinting.
11. Any image posted in the *Focus* Gallery or published in *Focus* may not be entered in any show.
12. Photographs not selected as finalists through juried judging may be entered in another show.
13. The exhibitor must have created all of the visual elements of the composition. Inclusion of third party or stock images and use of AI image generators is strictly prohibited. An exhibitor is, however, permitted to use non-representational, commercial textures and overlays.
14. All editing, including, but not limited to: lighting, color, and clarity adjustments; adding and removing visual elements; combining and blending imagery; image distortion, etc., must be the work of the exhibitor.
15. Matting, mounting, and printing may be done professionally.

16. Photographs must be mounted on black single-layer foam core cut to the exact size of the image and may not be over-matted. The surface finish is the choice of the exhibitor. Glass and framing are not permitted.
17. Unless otherwise specified, all photographs must be two-dimensional and printed on paper. All post-production work must be completed before the photograph is printed.
18. Photographs will be hung on a tri-fold with a black background.
19. Each entry must have the submission form affixed to the back of the photograph mounting with the class entered, exhibitor's name, garden club, zone, email, address, phone number, and novice status. The top of the photograph must be indicated. A second loose copy of the submission form should be mailed with the entry.
20. The division chair will provide an entry card to be staged with each photograph.
21. All entries will be passed by two members of the show's Photography Committee or the Photography judging program to verify that class specifications have been met. If a photograph is not passed, the exhibitor will be notified and allowed, if time permits, to send a replacement photograph.
22. Questions regarding class requirements may be directed to the class consultant and/or division chair.

24. Eligible winning images may be [submitted to the Focus Gallery](#).

A silver bowl awarded to the member exhibiting the best container garden containing three or more plants, correctly labeled and judged on the basis of their horticultural merit and artistic display.
